On a lovely August morning I went out on my deck with my macro lens to check for activity in our potted flowers. I spotted this interesting, colorful, shiny fly spending a lot of time on this flower. I fully expected him to fly off as soon as I raised my camera, but to my surprise, he continued to pose for me and allowed me to take multiple images while remaining relatively still. The image was taken at a rather high ISO so I processed it using DXO Pure Raw 2 to help clean up noise before doing basic Lightroom adjustments.

November 2 B&W Open EIC Competition Judge: Martin Heavner

Martin Heavner's images celebrate the form, tones and textures of the world's subtle beauty—both natural and manmade.

Working from both Frederick and the Bedford Valley near Cumberland, MD, Martin exhibits his photographs at galleries throughout the region. He has sold prints in two juried shows this past year and received the People's Choice Award at the 2021 Cumberland Valley Photography Exhibit at the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts.

Martin's work also has been published in magazines, calendars and electronic greeting cards. In 2021, he was the featured photographer in the annual Backbone Mountain Review, a literary journal showcasing artists in the Appalachian Mid-Atlantic region.

He frequently judges photography competitions for camera clubs and photo salons. For more than 40 years, he has been a member of various camera clubs – including the NIH Camera Club and Gaithersburg Camera Club – and

November 9 Black & White Open Print Judge: Ronald Beverly

Ronald Beverly is a fine-art photographer with an interest in creative and conceptual imagery. He's been producing images ranging from the literal to abstractions of nature that emphasize texture, tone, shape, and the elusive quality of light, a recurring characteristic of his work.

Advances in digital capture technologies and printable

substrates have created opportunities for Ronald to explore upscaling his photography to make it suitable for public art venues. Extensive research has revealed fabrication methods for reproducing imagery on glass, metal, and ceramic tiles that have led to successful commissions with MGM National Harbor, the Hotel at the University of Maryland, and the Southern Regional Technology & Recreation Complex of Prince George's County's Department of Parks and Recreation.

<u>Boxlight Studios LLC</u> is capable of doing commercial portrait and fashion work and photographing two-dimensional and three-dimensional creations for artist





portfolios. In Ronald's personal practice, he's able to print large-format fine art prints for any body of work in development. His gallery space gives him a venue for exhibition openings that showcase his latest endeavors for potential clients.

Ronald has been a professor and coordinator of photography at

Montgomery College since 2016. Between 2008 and 2016, he was an assistant professor and coordinator of photography at Howard University.

The Silver Water Collective will be presenting on various topics related to their photography and mission as a group of all female photographers who met online during their MFA Photography classes as part of the Savannah College of Art and Design graduate program. This powerhouse of photo-based artists joined forces to create, collaborate, and inspire other photographers in their artistic endeavors. They frequently speak to other groups, participate in panel discussions, offer body of work critiques to other photographers, and are continually looking for ways to promote the medium of photography in contemporary art culture. The group has a traveling exhibition of their collective work which is making its way around the

country and Canada; their most recent exhibition was in Michigan at the Patch and Remington Gallery.

On November 30th, Mara Magyarosi-Laytner, Steph Bauer, Brianna Dowd, and Emma Hopson will present their graduate thesis projects. Within these presentations, they will also cover broader themes such as experimental photography, alternative processes, conceptual photography and its place in the contemporary art world, the collective's mission and how it has impacted their momentum as creatives. They will offer some tips on how we as a club can achieve our own unique goals as photographers in today's competitive art culture.

Mara Magyarosi-Laytner is a Detroitbased artist, educator, and alternative process enthusiast. A graduate of both the College for Creative Studies and the Savannah College of Art and Design, she has experience across photography, education, and arts administration, culminating in her MA in Arts Administration in 2016 and her MFA in Photography in 2022. Her work pairs experimental photography methods to explore identity through a symbolic and poetic lens. The artist and her work have been shown in many spaces across the United States and internationally, including the ScotiaBank CONTACT Photography Festival in Toronto, Canada, and exhibitions in Italy, France, and Hungary. Mara has been featured in multiple articles and periodicals, including Complex, The Hand Magazine, and Aeonian Magazine. In 2022, her work from "The Untended Garden" was a Photo Lucida Critical Mass Finalist.

Steph Bauer is a multi-award winning commercial producer and filmmaker who has lived and worked in New Zealand, Australia, and the USA. Photography, education, and visual storytelling are her current practices and, when time permits, she like to write screenplays, short stories and poetry. Steph has directed, written, and produced short films. Her BA is in Mass Comm from Loyola of Chicago, and her MFA is in photography from SCAD.

Steph's passion is to inspire through storytelling in all its various forms and formats. She is passionate about helping to create a more loving and balanced world. Her goals are to inspire, entertain and motivate through her work.

Brianna Dowd is an NC- based artist whose background is in fine art photography and graphic design. She earned her BFA in 2017 from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and is currently pursuing a Master of Fine Art at the Savannah College of Art & Design in Georgia.

Brianna is also the founder and CEO of Butterfly Visuals, LLC, a media company providing quality service to creative and goal-oriented individuals in the areas of photography, graphic design, website design, promotional design, branding materials, social media content, and more. She values the gift of creativity and its process and is fully dedicated to providing her clients with an engaging and collaborative experience, positive approaches to concepts, and key customer service.

Emma Creighton Hopson earned a Master of Fine Arts in photography from the Savannah College of Art and Design and lives with her family in Savannah, Georgia. Her images explore themes of identity and time as they relate to relationships and the social landscape. She works primarily with a view camera as a way to connect with the history and craft of photography, and she embraces the medium's ability to affect perception.

Hopson's work has been exhibited at Contact Photo Festival, The Do Good Fund, and Filter Photo. She was recognized as a Critical Mass finalist in 2021 and 2022 and received the Collinsworth Emerging Photographer Acquisition Fund Award in 2022 via The Do Good Fund.

The artist's most recent body of work, "Wish You Were Here You Are," rejects patriarchal idealizations of the maternal by visualizing the nuances of being a mother. It also reflects on the illusory condition of photography and the disappearance of physical photographs.

Heads Up! Panel Photo Critique December 21



NBCC members are invited to submit photos to the 2022 Panel Photo Critique session to be held on Wednesday, December 21. The critique will employ a panel of three experienced NBCC photographers (James Corbett, Cynthia Keith and Carol Walsh) to review and comment on your images.

This event is an excellent opportunity for you to get quality feedback on your photographs. There are no awards – just actionable advice from some of our top experts. Names will not be displayed, and participants may choose to remain anonymous. But, to maximize everyone's usable takeaway, we encourage you to speak up if the panel has questions or if you need clarification on their recommendations.

The Panel Photo Critique will proceed like this:

- · NBCC members may submit up to 4 electronic images each.
- · Number your submitted images 1 through 4 in order of priority for having them critiqued (just in case we don't get through all the images). The panel will

critique all #1s first, then proceed with #2s, etc. until we either finish them all or run out of time.

- The panel will view each projected image and offer their assessment of its strengths and weaknesses in the context of an external competition or juried exhibit.
- A timekeeper will assist the panel in staying on pace.



Participants should submit images in a process similar to the Electronic Image Competition, i.e., JPG files with maximum dimensions 1920 x 1200 pixels (width x height). There is no time restriction on when the images were taken, and there is no required theme. There is also no distinction between novice, intermediate and advanced images as each image will be critiqued on the basis of its own merits. The filename convention for the Panel Photo Critique will be as follows:

Priority Number-Your Name.jpg. For example: **1-John Smith.jpg**, **2-John Smith.jpg**, etc.

Submit up to 4 of your photographs as attachments to a single email, and send them to: nbccmdprog@gmail.com



Robert Barkin's photograph, "Perfect Quiet," has been accepted in the Maryland Waterways Exhibit at the Benjamin Gaither Center Art Gallery. It will run from October 21, 2022 - January 16, 2023. The center is located at 80A Bureau Drive, Gaithersburg, MD. Hours are M-Th from 8:30 am - 6 pm and Friday from 8:30 am to 4 pm.



James Corbett was named a silver medalist at the Professional Photographers of America's (PPA) 2022 International Photographic Competition. Each entrant submitted up to 4 images for judging by a panel of 36 eminent jurors from across the USA. Out of a total of 5,021 entries, all 4 of his images were judged to meet the standard of excellence for inclusion in the Merit Collection. One of his images, "Sunset Tide," was chosen for the Imaging Excellence Collection - the best of the best.

The images chosen for the Excellent Collection will be published in a book and accepted into the PPA Loan Collection, which is displayed at photographic exhibitions, conventions, and other events. As one of only 132 silver medalists in 2022, James's work will be on display at the upcoming Imaging USA, held January 22-24 in Nashville, Tennessee.





Hi Everyone! I'm [Cat Simmons] excited to announce my first solo exhibition coming up at Montgomery College, Rockville. The show will open on Wednesday, November 9th with a 5:00-6:30 pm reception. Light refreshments will be served and I will plan for my artist talk to take place from 5:30-5:45pm.

I will be presenting my body of work entitled "Objet a II Unremembering." In this body of work, I rely upon photography's ability to visually mediate personal memory through the family photograph in order to rewrite my past. By destroying photographs and rebuilding them from the consequential rubble, in essence, memory is loosened and newly abstracted versions of those memories are formed. These reconstructed photographs demand new interpretations and linguistic descriptions of past memory as they unanchor what used to be and allow for the authoring of new associations within each composition.

Please note: Our club does have a hybrid competition that evening, but I have planned the timing of my event so it does not conflict with the competition times. Coincidentally, Ronald Beverly, the gallery director at MC will be our judge that night! (See page 4 of this issue.) I hope you'll come out to see this exhibition of which I am so proud to finally have on display in a public space!

News

The PSA Festival was enjoyable and was attended by three NBCC members: Maude Svensson, Nancy Wolejsza and me (Judy Burr). I like to hear from attendees and am including their comments as written.

Maude Svensson: A PSA Week Full of Photography, Friends, and Field Trips

I attended the **PSA Annual Photo Festival** in Colorado Springs in
September. It was the second time for
me to be at a PSA Photo Festival. The
first was three years ago and just before
COVID, when the PSA Photo Festival took
place in Spokane, Washington, close to
wonderful and photogenic Palouse. If you
have never participated in these
festivals, I can warmly recommend that
you try to attend one. Next year, it will
be in Williamsburg, Virginia.

In my view, there are at least three different advantages to attending. The first is that you meet lots of interesting and fun people who share your interest: photography. At my first festival, I met two ladies who were such fun to be with, and they shared their photography experiences with me. We kept in contact after the festival, emailing each other, and we decided to participate in the next PSA festival together. Then COVID came, and it took us three years to reunite in Colorado Springs. This year, I enjoyed

the company of several other friends, including Judy and Nancy from NBCC.

The second reason is the fantastic presentations and workshops at the festivals. We are all different and enjoy different presentations, but there is definitely something for everyone. The two presenters I enjoyed the most at Colorado Springs were Harold Davis and Lisa Kristine. Harold Davis was a positive surprise to me because I am not really interested in photographing flowers. I went to his presentation mainly because I had time to do so, and one of my friends was extremely interested in his presentation, "Photographing Flowers for Transparency." He had a unique technique for making his photographs, using a light box in his process. I just loved his photos and his very practical way of showing us every step in a detailed way. I took careful notes, and I hope to build on his process to make unique photos of boats or seascapes or anything else that I find interesting.

The other fantastic presenter was Lisa Kristine. She makes wonderful photographs that aim to increase viewers' understanding of humanity—its different cultures around the world and the circumstances in which different people live and work. I was shocked and saddened to see how some children are forced to work in extremely hard and unbearable circumstances. I will never

forget the eyes and bodies of small Asian children who carry heavy blocks of marble or granite on their backs. These stone blocks are as large and heavy as the children themselves. And I remind myself that I have granite and marble (produced in China) in both of my bathrooms and in my kitchen. As a consumer, I contribute to this modern type of slavery.

The third reason is the opportunity to join PSA field trips. I had never been to Colorado before and took the opportunity to go to the Garden of the Gods Visitor & Nature Center for a sunset tour, the Paint Mine Interpretive Park at sunrise, and Cripple Creek for a full day tour by steam train and bus to see gold mines. In addition, I stayed one additional week in Colorado. My husband Lars joined me, we rented a car, and we drove up to Aspen. From there, we did different hikes to see the Maroon Bells, the Independence Pass area, and Leadville. These experiences were good for both the soul and the body!

Nancy Wolejsza: PSA Festival 2022— Lasting Impressions

Of special interest to me was the field trip to HawkQuest, a birds of prey sanctuary that is home to hawks, owls, eagles and falcons. Another attraction was the cog train to Pike's Peak. The train climbed 8,000 feet to reach the summit, where we saw fast-moving clouds that first obscured and then revealed the gorgeous view.

This year, the emphasis of the presentations was on the artistic possibilities of photography. Programs included visual story telling by John Paul Caponigro, using images in wall hangings by Lisa Langell, and photographing flowers for transparency by Harold Davis. There was also an interesting session, "Do Your Images Have a Future?" by Wendy Shattil. Wendy talked about preserving images through many iterations of technology use and organizations that accept images for future use.

The festival had a variety of opportunities for field trips and workshops. I went on the birds of prey trip, which gave us a chance to photograph a variety of birds that might not qualify for PSA's nature competitions, but it was interesting to see several species and learn about them. They were rescued birds and were handled by the falconers. I also attended a macro workshop taught by Charles Needle, a photographer familiar to NBCC. It was fun to see all the equipment he uses and recommends. We had a chance to work on our own projects with his assistance as needed. The evening programs were

all excellent—even the one that had to be done remotely because of John Paul Caponigro's medical issues.

The program that Maude mentioned by Lisa Kristine was for the International Understanding Through Photography (IUTP) Award. This annual award "recognizes an accomplished photographer whose images and their presentation have clearly contributed to the advancement of understanding among people. IUTP honors living photographers whose work has had a unique impact on the world by focusing attention or changing perceptions. The recipient need not be a member of PSA."

The Mid-Atlantic Chapter was the second runner-up in the chapter showcase, continuing the chapter's record of finishing at or near the top. Three NBCC members had images in the showcase: "Jumping Spider in a Dahlia" by David Terao, "Sweet Bee" by Jim Turner, and "Balusters in a Curve" by Judy Burr. Each chapter may submit up to 12 images from 12 different chapter members. You can see all of the 2022 PSA chapter showcase entries here.

1st Place Spring Pollinator, Brookside Gardens © **Dick Pelroy**

This hand-held image was taken at maximum aperture with a macro lens I normally use only on a tripod. It was maintained about 10 inches above some blue flowers that attracted bees of different shapes and sizes. A high ISO setting was used to freeze the action. Many images were taken trying to keep the flower and bees in the same plane. This one succeeded in trapping a lovely little bee with iridescent transparent wings just as it landed on the flowers. The shallow depth of field and resulting soft background contributed to the final result.

2nd Place Geranium Seed Pod © **Bruce Cyr**


This photo is a 27-image focus stack taken with flash on the same day, using the same gear in the same location as my shot of last month's hoverfly. I replaced the original black construction paper background with a plain black layer in Photoshop. The hardest step was painting around the entire prickly circumference of the seed pod to eliminate a haze due to wind motion. This shot was the best of over two dozen. Looking back, I should have moved the project indoors but working outdoors was a wonderful reward for my stubbornness.

3rd Place Two Medusa Dancing © **Tammy Trocki**

This photo was taken at Baltimore's National Aquarium where these giant medusa swim in constant loops overlapping each other most of the time, sometimes in good light, often not. So the trick was patience while waiting for good lighting and interesting nonoverlapping shapes. Cloning out a third guy from the background helped too!

I enhanced the colors a bit in Lightroom. The photo didn't need much other processing.

1st Place Track Broom © **James Corbett**


I was teaching a light painting workshop when I made this image of the undercarriage of a track sweeper at the National Capital Trolley Museum. It is a composite of 3 long exposures of 15 seconds each where I painted, with a handheld light, the areas that I wanted visible. I was careful to create depth by painting in consistent strokes from the upper left. In post-processing, I layered and blended desirable portions of each exposure to create the final image.



2nd Place Common Buckeye on Rattlesnake Master © **Gail Bingham**

This image was taken in the Roger's Butterfly Garden in August as part of a Northwest Arkansas Master Naturalist's volunteer project on starting a butterfly garden with native plants. It was taken handheld at 1/400 second shutter priority, ISO 100, with my 100mm Macro lens. I spent time on the crop and touched the image up a little, but not a lot. The plant is called a Rattlesnake Master.





3rd Place Jellyfish, Monterey Aquarium © **John Willis**

I found this lovely jellyfish this summer at the Monterey Aquarium and grabbed the image through the glass with an iPhone 13 Pro. I used Lightroom auto white balance to bring out the color.
