# October 26 Program Abstract Architecture Photography: Creativity in Composition with Angie McMonigal

Angie is a fine art and commercial architecture photographer based in Chicago. She strives to bring a detailed, and thoughtful perspective to her work, whether for clients or through the workshops she leads.

This evening, Angie will focus on creative approaches to architectural subjects. Her emphasis will be on architectural details and creating abstracts of the built environment. She'll share how to uncover creative viewpoints and how to best utilize compositional tools to create more compelling images. than two decades; she brings the meditative calm of her upbringing to a terrain that's always transforming.



Drawing from her education in the micro sciences (molecular biology, microbiology, virology) her focus is more frequently on bold architectural details rather than sweeping cityscapes, creating images that celebrate those unexpectedly iconic elements hiding in plain sight.

## New Photopia Photo Essay Software

As announced in the August issue of the Lens and Eye, NBCC will present the annual Photo Essay Showcase on Sunday, March 12, 2023, *in person* at the Asbury Methodist Village auditorium. And we now invite members to begin preparing their essays. If you are thinking of doing an essay, please notify the essay committee so we can begin planning for the show. We need to know approximately how many essays are in production and the topics of each. We don't want multiple essays on the same topic. Draft essays are due not later

than Dec 31st. Earlier submissions will get more feedback and assistance.

Fortuitously, Photopia has just released version 2.0 of its software, along with an excellent *Photopia User Guide*. For members who used ProShow software in the distant BC past (BC=before Covid), Photopia was built by the ProShow development team plus others and can be thought of as a more advanced version of ProShow. Photopia 2.0 is the latest version with new features, an improved user interface, many new styles/transitions, and lots of new royalty-free music files.

Photopia runs on both Windows PCs and Mac computers, and IMHO is the best photo essay software available. With a rich set of video tutorials and an excellent *User Guide*, it is relatively easy to learn. And with a wide range of builtin slide styles, transitions, and royaltyfree music files, it is possible to create fancy essays, in minutes, for personal use. To prepare essays for the NBCC annual showcase, displaying a member's body of work, takes a little more time. And the essay committee is here to help. Members can use any essay creation software to produce videos for the annual showcase, and Mac users may choose to use iMovie, for example, which is available for free with Mac computers. Basic essays can be prepared using the Slideshow Module in Lightroom. However, Photopia provides a richer set of capabilities, but requires a subscription. With our club discount Photopia costs \$8/month, but you can activate/deactivate it, so you only pay in the months when you use the software. Contact Stu Mathison for the discount code.

### Photopia Software, cont'd

For members unfamiliar with Photopia and interested in learning how to make photo essays for personal use, and/or for the NBCC Annual Showcase, we recommend participating in the Essay Study Group, which will start Thursday evening at 7:30 pm October 6th in virtual (Zoom) format and continue on the first Thursday of each month through January.

We also recommend reading the early chapters in the Photopia User Guide and watching the many free Photopia tutorials on the Photopia website and on the Choice Slides website. There are links to these tutorials in the Photopia software "Help" tab.

The most comprehensive set of Photopia tutorials is available on Udemy (five hours, 57 separate videos) for \$35. Members can also get details on the NBCC Photo Essay Showcase on the club website under "Activities>Photo Essays". And members can also view previously presented essays in the "Members Only" section of the club website. After logging in, go to "Members only info" under your name, select "Photo Essays", then select one of the program years to see the essays from that year. Most of the 250 video essays prepared by club members can be streamed from the online archive.

#### **News**

There is probably some confusion about the designations shown after PSA members' names. In fact, there were errors in some recent issues of the "PSA Journal."

"ROPA" stands for Recognition of Photographic Achievement. So, QPSA, PPSA, EPSA, MPSA and more are distinctions that are earned by competing in PSA-recognized exhibitions and having images accepted. Details can be found at <a href="https://psa-photo.org/page/mo-ropa">https://psa-photo.org/page/mo-ropa</a>.

Honors are quite different from distinctions, as recipients are elected by the Honors Committee. Honors are given to PSA members who have contributed services to PSA and/or the entire photographic community. Individuals must be sponsored by a member who has an honor and endorsed by two members who also have honors. It is a lengthy process that starts with the individual completing a Candidate's Record. Details can be found at <a href="https://psa-photo.org/page/mo-honors">https://psa-photo.org/page/mo-honors</a>.

There are four levels of honors, with the first being **APSA** (Associate).

"This honor is awarded to PSA members in good standing for significant service to photographers, within PSA and/or in other photographic

organizations, such as clubs, councils, federations, national and international societies, and other organizations, or to the general photographic community worldwide."

The second level of honors is **FPSA** (Fellow).

"This honor is awarded to PSA members in good standing for exceptional service to photographers, within PSA and/or in other photographic organizations, such as clubs, councils, federations, national and international societies, and other organizations, or to the general photographic community worldwide. Service may include organizational or administrative work, lecturing and presentations, writings and publication of articles, instruction and judging, among other contributions. Proficiency or photographic achievement, or a work background or education relevant to these services may help explain the value of these services, but photographic proficiency and achievement are not listed as requirements for FPSA honors.

Given eight Honors Committee members, six affirmative votes are needed for FPSA. If the Committee has only seven members, five affirmative votes are needed for FPSA."

The third level of honors is **HonPSA** (**Honorary Member**), and the fourth is **HonFPSA**. These levels are much harder

to attain. Recipients are PSA members who have contributed more to PSA and the photographic world than can be imagined. You can find the names of honors recipients on the PSA website under "Recognitions." Among those listed are Aubrey Bodine, Ollie Fife (an NBCC member), Yousef Karsh, Edward Steichen, Alfred Stieglitz and Edward Weston.

## **Intermediate Print Winners September Open Competition**



1st Place Norway Mountain Tundra © **Tom Marchessault** 

This is a view of the snow-covered mountains from the Oslo to Bergen train, traveling from sea level to sea level after crossing the green valleys and snow-covered mountains of Norway. The miles of mountain plains deep with snow, even in late June, contrast with two cabins that provide virtually the only color in the image. The post-processing emphasized the near seamless transition from white ground to white sky against the dark brown of the cabins with a prominent colorful door.

I was walking the Walkway Over The Hudson this summer. At the end this gentleman was just resting. I engaged him in conversation, which led to a series of photos of which this was one. He was a really gentle, nice guy with some obvious challenges.

At Cape May in May with NBCC, near well-known birding grounds, the only flamingos to be seen were these lawn ornaments. Maternal affection seemed to bond these two 'birds' in a cheekily curated family.

As a part of Carol Walsh's compositing class, I took this photo of a model, repeated her three times and added a railroad background. The tracks are a critical element, to help focus on the model.

#### 3rd Place Barrel Race Contestant © **Bruce Cyr**

This was taken at the Maryland State Fair Rodeo event, with a Sony full frame camera, Tamron zoom @180mm, f4, 1/800th exposure, ISO 25600. It took several hours of Photoshop work to remove, hide or disguise some of the men in or on the iron framework. This was the best of nearly 500 shots of barrel race contestants. Developed in DxO DeepPRIME. For details see my NBCC Chat Group Post.

#### 1st Place Hoverfly on Star Grass Blossom © **Bruce Cyr**

A hoverfly is about 1/4" long and is the second most important pollinating species after bees. It's a true fly with no stinger. It derives its name from its reproduction method: the male carries the female on half-hour flights. Hours of Photoshop work was required to remove burnt-out highlight spots. It was taken in my backyard, where my wife plants native species to attract bees, hummingbirds and other wildlife. Sony full frame camera, Canon EF 100mm L macro + Canon EF Life-Sized Converter + Sony 14X.Teleconverter + MetaBones EF to E-mount adapter.


## **Intermediate EIC Winners September Open Competition**

1st Place Mexico Dolores Hidalgo Charro and Rope © **Erico Silva** 

This photo was taken in the Mexican city of Dolores Hidalgo during an exhibition of rope handling skills by cowboys (called "charros"). The sun was dropping lower and lower, casting long shadows. I positioned myself to photograph this young charro and his shadow and managed to capture several moments. This one is my favorite, with the circular shape, the dust raised by the rope after hitting the ground, the interesting position of the hands to control the rope, and the shadow.



In May I joined other NBCC members at our workshop in Cape May, NJ. One morning, we started with a sunrise shoot on the beach across the street from our hotel. While we were there, a bicyclist started riding back and forth on the beach, and many of us included him in our photos. After a time, the bike rider stopped to talk to one of the club members and the sky turned to the orange hues you see in my picture.


#### 1st Place Hummingbird in Lexington © **John Willis**

I saw hummingbirds at the feeder outside the kitchen at my son's house in Lexington, Massachusetts and noticed the long tongues darting in and out. I took numerous telephoto images to try to catch that tongue in motion. Credit the Topaz Sharpen AI app with the post-processing detail.



At dawn on a cool, foggy October morning, this image was taken on the Allegheny front, otherwise known as the Eastern Continental Divide. It is located at 4200 feet at the boundary line between the Nature Conservancy's Bear Rocks Preserve and Dolly Sods Wilderness in the Monongahela National Forest in West Virginia. It is at the height of full color of the fall red blueberry leaves. The heather also includes mountain ash and mountain laurel which are mixed in with red spruce trees. The rocks on the rim of the Allegheny front are a conglomerate that contains quartz pebbles. This is an extraordinary photo location.

This photo was taken during a Badlands workshop I attended, led by Ian Plant this July. I am always interested in the shapes and patterns of beautiful mud cracks. This time we had an opportunity to find our own mud cracks in the wilderness. This little green plant caught my eye. I loved it the most among the many mud crack photos I took on this trip simply because of the focus point in the image - the little green plant. I think the little bit of green gave the photo a soul that may evoke emotion as well. Life is teeming with vitality and is likewise terribly tenacious.
