November 3 Judge: Robb Hill



Robb Hill's photographic work focuses on understanding how identity and place intersect to create our notions of self and belonging. By emulsifying two photographic traditions - documentary and landscape - into one methodology, Robb takes a fresh approach to both forms. By blending personal narrative with documentary methodology, he tries to remove the omniscient narrator from his work to allow viewers to be welcomed participants.

Graduating from Indiana University with a degree in documentary photography, Robb has lived and worked in Budapest, Chicago, Atlanta, and Washington, D.C. In 2020, he returned to his journalistic roots by freelancing mostly for The Washington Post and other news organizations during the pandemic.

Robb's "HomeLands" project has been featured in the New York Times Lens

Blog, NPR's "Picture Show," and Lenscratch. It has been exhibited throughout the Midwest.

When not wandering the streets photographing, Robb can be found playing drums with his wife for the Midwest Industrial, an all-original rock band, or with the Big Bang Jazz Band.

Waitlists have been established for each program. When inevitable complications arise, forcing participants to cancel their plans, members on the waitlist will be able to join the workshop in question.



We finally felt safe going back to New York after being vaccinated. New York is a constant kaleidoscope of things to photograph. I started walking around the lower West Side, an area that is changing with soaring unusual architecture. I spotted these two buildings and the contrast of pastel colors, lines and patterns struck me. Alan Sislen suggested converting it to monochrome, which I did. It became stronger in monochrome. I kept a color print for my personal collection of photos I like but won't submit!

I did submit the color version the night before at the NIHCC and the judge blasted it - couldn't see a pattern! I thought our judge was excellent because he educated and explained his choices. Oh well, that's why we have chocolate and vanilla ice cream as my wife is fond of saying.

In August I attended a photo workshop in Santa Fe, New Mexico. One of our field trips went to a ranch where, in addition to scenery, horses and such, we also had models dressed in western wear. It was a good experience to learn to direct the models to get the kind of images we wanted.

Rather than "curse" the tourists standing in "my shot," I embraced the moment and took many photos of the dramatic arches, tourists and all. I tried a variety of compositions, with many different tourists. I felt this composition with a single tourist was the best. His pose was helpful, and he provided a sense of the enormous scale of nature's work. Although I eventually was able to take photos of the arches without people, I liked this image the best. Advanced Print Winners October (3-Year Open) Competition



1st Place On the "O" Line © **Stan Collyer**

The National Zoo's "O" line is a fifty-foot-high cable system that allows orangutans to travel from the Great Ape House to the Think Tank. It gives the residents some exercise, and is lots of fun for visiting photographers, although standing directly underneath can provide extra sport for the residents. Shooting into a bright sky required me to dial in lots of exposure bias, which resulted in a "high key" image that I liked, but a previous judge didn't. So I tried again this month, with a darkened background created with Lightroom's radial filter.





2nd Place Small Bee in Aster © **Bruce Cyr**

My image used a hyper-macro setup to capture a life-sized portrait of a bee that was 1/4" in size. I started with a Canon f2.8L 100mm 1X macro and added the Canon Life-Size Converter that got me to 1.5X. Then I added a Kenko 1.4X Teleconverter to get to 2.1X maximum magnification. Usually non-Canon TCs don't work with Canon lenses because the Canon body detects the "alien" element and freezes everything. But there was no Canon camera in this rig! All the lens gear was attached to a Metabones II Canon EF to Sony F-mount adapter fitted to a Sony A7R III camera. To get enough shutter speed I used an Adorama Flash-Point flash in High-Speed Sync Mode. To prevent large specular highlights on the bee, I directed diffused light down to the subject at a 45-degree angle using a Luminance Quest 80-20 bounce adapter. I'm considering doing classes on bee, wasp and butterfly photography should there be enough interest.

I was on a DC Metro train recently after having taken some photos in downtown DC. I had my camera on my lap while looking at the photos I had taken, when I noticed this very interesting gentleman sitting across from me. So I changed the viewfinder setting to live view and focused the camera on this individual. I then took a couple of shots of him, but he was unaware. And fortunately, the noise from the subway train covered up the clicking sound of the shutter. Later, when I looked at the photo on my computer, I noticed several bright spots surrounding his portrait. To cover these up, and to direct the viewer's eyes to the subject, I added a heavy vignette.

The summer in Sweden is short but wonderful. Already by the end of August, the sun sets at about 9 pm. To sail with the traditional sailing ship Helmi, for no other reason than to watch the sun set and enjoy one's time on Earth, is like a gift from God that not everyone can enjoy. This photograph - together with many others - I shot because my heart was filled with gratitude for the blessings of life.

3rd Place Mirror Image with Fish **© Maude Svensson**

Driving towards the north of Sweden from Stockholm, I got an impulse to visit an old fishing village on the coast of the Baltic Sea. Standing alone on the village dock, I saw the fishermen's boathouses proudly looking at their mirror images in the water. Their bodies dressed in red and orange stood in stark contrast to the blue sky. In the shimmering water I saw a large school of herring. The swimming and jumping of the fish caused the mirror images to ripple and dance in the otherwise still water. It was a magical feeling. For a long time I stood by myself on the dock in awe of the beauty of nature and the world. Then I took the photo.

One day I was fortunate enough to capture the family as they traveled together along the O-line. Their similar facial expressions and body positions made me wonder what mission they were on. Redd, the baby, seemed to really bring new life to all the older orangutans.

The photo was taken this spring at Ladew Gardens in Maryland. I liked the original capture, but I experimented with settings in Lightroom. A good amount of contrast, saturation (yellow), and dehaze (negative) resulted in this look.

I took this photo at the 2019 Spring Matinee Races at the Pinehurst Harness Track in North Carolina. A friend and I were talking with the driver of the starter truck, which leads the harness racers to the starting line. He offered to let us ride in the back of the truck, with the starting gate, for several races. This allowed me to get a close-up of this driver, the sulky (two-wheeled cart) and the horse as they went around the first turn. I used a shutter speed of 1/800th of a second to get the image. The tire tracks of the sulky created some interesting leading lines for the photo.

1st Place Village Children **Melissa Clark**

On a photo trip to India in 2019, we spent several days in Varanasi, in Uttar Pradesh. Although most of our time was spent exploring city streets and the ghats on the edge of the Ganges, we also visited several small rural villages. In one of those I encountered these two children, whose clothing seemed to echo the background and whose eyes were haunting. This photo reminds me of their spirit and strength.



2nd Place Shooting the Ice Bubbles © **James Chia**

This was shot on the frozen Abraham Lake in the Canadian Rockies. The foreground methane ice bubbles trapped in the frozen lake and stacked up in layers like pancakes give a 3-dimensional visual effect. The amazing natural phenomenon attracted many photographers to search and capture it - including me - on a bitterly cold day.

Down the Ribbon Road. Every time I am in Valley of Fire I look for this road. Different angles offer different effects. I love the undulating dips and turns as well as the soft blue-grey texture of the asphalt against the rough golden terrain.
