ary Ann is both a past Vice President for Competitions and Past President of the Northern Virginia **Photographic** Society (NVPS). She is a 1995 graduate of the Washington School of Photography and has augmented that training with many photography and Adobe Photoshop courses, including the famed Freeman Patterson's "Photography and Visual Design" workshop in 2007. She worked as a professional photographer and videographer from 1997 to 2009, and for several years ran a portrait studio in her home. Experienced as a judge and critique leader, Mary Ann completed Joe Miller's seminar on judging in December 2006.

Her images have won numerous awards in the NVPS; ribbons from the Vienna Photography shows, where she won "Best in Show" in 2001; and several of her images were juried into the Art League of Alexandria's monthly exhibits at The Torpedo Factory, where she also won a prestigious Equal Award in 2002 and maintained a bin for two years. She was named NVPS "Photographer of the Year" in both 2005 and 2006 in the category of Enhanced Prints, and won two "Print of the Year" awards in 2000 and two again in 2005. Her image



## Member Profile Ken Goldman



en Goldman is enthusiastic about his life and his photography, and hopes to retire from his day job in a few years to more fully enjoy both. At present, he is serving on the Judges Committee and has to rearrange his schedule in order to leave work in time to receive and introduce those competition judges for whom he is a sponsor. This is his second year with NBCC. He competes in the Novice Traditional Electronic category and has won significant points.

Ken spent his early years on Long Island, NY, went to college at Johns Hopkins University, and graduated in 1974 with a BES in Mechanical Engineering. His first job was with the Naval Research and Development Center in Annapolis. MD. doing acoustic tests on submarines to assess what underwater noises they might be making that they shouldn't. He next spent five years with the Coast Guard in Washington, D.C. studying environmental technology specifically related to oil spills. Then it was back to Annapolis for more work on acoustics. During this period, he met, married, and divorced his first wife. He was single again in 1985 when his aunt offered him the phone number of the niece of a friend of hers who lived in Baltimore. Ken phoned Barbara; they met and dated, and were married two years later in 1987. (How could a guy named Ken resist a "doll" named Barb?) Ken moved to Baltimore to live with Barbara and Stephanie, her daughter by a previous marriage.

Meanwhile, Ken transferred from the Annapolis Lab to the David Taylor Model Basin in Carderock, and commuted from Baltimore. He worked at the Pentagon for one and a half years as an advisor on acoustic technology. He also vetted sales of equipment to foreign purchasers. He then returned to a program management position at the Model Basin where, for a period of eight years, he managed over 130 employees at Carderock and at multiple detachments around the country. His wife began working in D.C. as well, doing program management for the Inter-American Development Bank. When Stephanie left for college at Yale in 1996. Ken and Barbara moved to Maryland, where they have lived ever since.

Ken has always enjoyed photography as a way to give expression to his left brain while incorporating his engineering skills. He cannot find his first Brownie box camera, but still has an Instamatic 100 purchased to photograph the New York World's Fair. He also took photos of the first moon landing. as it appeared on TV, and puts these on Facebook each year to celebrate the event. He next acquired an Olympus OM-1. An Olympus OM-2 was in use at his work place, and he was able to borrow and try out its various lenses. His next camera was a Canon Rebel 2000 purchased when he and Barb began to travel. and was used for trips to England, Scotland, Wales, Greece, and France. He has quite a portfolio of shots from France, as he and Barbara traveled there twice a year for three years. One of the Musée D'Orsay is his favorite.

In 2005, his daughter—now working as a journalist—moved to South Africa. Ken and Barb visited her there, and traveled in Namibia and Mozambique on several occasions. For these excursions, Ken purchased a digital Rebel XTi, a Manfrotto tripod, and a 70-300mm DO lens. He has quite a collection of nature, animal, and landscape shots taken on safaris, hikes, and self-guided travel.

Two years ago, Ken and Barbara took an extensive trip to the Galapagos Islands. Ken added a Canon 7D to his equipment collection. He took 2,700 images while in Ecuador and Barbara, working with a Panasonic point-and-shoot, logged in 700 shots. Ken acquired an underwater housing for one of his old Canon automatics and shot underwater life while snorkeling. He uses Lightroom to organize his work and has taken classes and tutorials with Eliot Cohen. He has also taken classes with Nikhil Bahl and enjoys Roy Sewall's photo critiques. He would like to learn to print his own images (so far, all are professionally printed) and to use Photoshop to enhance and improve them. He hopes to do this after he retires. One of his travel articles was accepted by The Washington Post for a segment in their travel section as "Your Vacation in Lights" (see Sunday, November 29, 2009). ohn Hoover is the Instructional Coordinator for Photography at Montgomery College. Before that, he served as Director of Photography at The Metropolitan Center for the Visual Arts (VisArts), a non-profit community arts center located in Rockville, MD. He expanded the photography education program by organizing classes, workshops, and seminars led by internationally renowned photographers.

For his work at VisArts, John was awarded the 2007 Excellence in the Arts and Humanities Award by the Montgomery County Arts and Humanities Council, acknowledging the contributions he made in improving the Photography Department to the point of national recognition among professional photographers and industry specialists. He also served as Professor for Montgomery College's Photography Department for four years.



He will give specific recommendations on how to strengthen the photos through processing and/or reshooting.

He will share with you his experiences and what he had to learn other than photography to be successful as a professional. Joel will cover such topics as what photo labs and album companies he uses, and what kinds of equipment he takes to all of his event shoots. In addition, he will discuss how you gain credibility with your clients and what associations and organizations will benefit you in your career. This should be an informative and interesting discussion about a subject that seems to loom in the minds of most of us at one time or another.

Kent Mason – As a result of scheduling issues, I will fill in and make a presentation on Wildlife Photography in West Virginia. As those members who have been around over 25 years know, wildlife photography was my original passion when I joined the Club and later I moved into landscape photography. I still do wildlife photography with regularity, and over the last eight years I have created a collection of images that I have shared with Nature Conservancy. I will present a wide range of wildlife images and discuss how I created them. Equipment, various photographic techniques, composition, and the use of light will be covered.

Also, both Joel and Kent have produced books on their subjects, which will be displayed for your viewing pleasure during the break. Questions about publishing will be answered.

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#### NBCC Field Trip – April 13 United States Botanic Garden

ur April field trip will be to the **United States Botanic Garden** on Friday, April 13, during their orchid exhibit. The Garden, the "National Greenhouse," is located close to the U.S. Capitol and houses eight garden rooms to showcase an incredible variety of plant life—over 4,000 plants. The range of exhibits includes medicinal, desert, primeval, and rare and endangered plants.

There are many opportunities to photograph inside the conservatory as well as outside. Adjacent to the conservatory is the National Garden, which includes the Rose, Butterfly, and Regional Gardens; the Lawn Terrace; and the First Ladies' Water Garden. Across the street from the conservatory is a landscaped flower garden and fountain at Bartholdi Park. Both the conservatory and the National Garden are open from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm. Bartholdi Park is open from dawn to dusk.

NBCC has permission to use up to five tripods at one time during our visit, so we will meet before entry to coordinate the use of the permits.

**Date and time:** Friday, April 13, from 12:45 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

**Location:** 100 Maryland Avenue, SW, Washington, D.C. 20001, across from the U.S. Capitol Building along First Street, SW, between Maryland Avenue and C Street. Bartholdi Park sits behind the Conservatory and is accessible from Independence Avenue, Washington Avenue, or First Street.

**Meeting place:** Main entrance of the Conservatory at 100 Maryland Avenue, SW.

**Getting there:** The closest Metro station is Federal Center on the Orange and Blue Lines. Parking is limited with a small number of accessible spaces, as well as some metered street parking.

The NBCC field trip for May has the colonial town of Lewes, DE as its destination. The dates are the 18<sup>th</sup> through the 20<sup>th</sup>. This announcement is just to let you know that you should shop early for lodgings, especially if you plan to stay only a single night. Many hotels are only willing to book for a minimum of two nights at that time of year and prices can get quite steep. We are awaiting confirmation from the <a href="Hotel Rodney">Hotel Rodney</a>, which indicated that they had a few rooms left, but that reservations were arriving at a good pace.

Many of you are surely familiar with Lewes. Tripadvisor reveals a <u>number of things to visit in Lewes</u>. It also has a considerable historic heritage, dating from an ill-fated Dutch settlement in 1631 through later Dutch and English occupations. The strategic location at the mouth of Delaware Bay figures in several military events over the years. Photo opportunities range from sunrises, to beach landscapes, to shore birds, to colonial architecture, streets scenes, maritime settings and many more.

The particular weekend that we have chosen was selected in part because it promises lunar and tide conditions favorable to horseshoe crab nesting. As a resort town, Lewes also has a variety of dining spots.

he March issue of the PSA Journal includes a review of "Topaz Adjust v.5.0," which sells for \$49, but has a **free** upgrade from previous versions. Since some NBCC members use the program, we have seen the results available from the program. The new version includes over 100 new presets and the effects/presets panel now has seven different collections. Book reviews cover the following new books: Nature Photography: Photo Workshop by Nat Coalson, which includes assignments; The New Complete Guide to Night and Low-Light Digital Photography (updated edition) by Lee Frost; Get Your Photography on the Web by Rafael "RC" Concepcion, which sounds like a good guide to designing a website and selling your photos on the web; and Speedliters's Handbook: Learning to Craft Light with Canon® Speedlites by Syl Arena, which is an indepth resource for owners of Canon Speedlites.

"Drury's Digital Diary" continues with a discussion of the Develop Module in Lightroom. Drury begins by telling the reader what he thinks are the most important image-optimization objectives. He offers good advice for any processing: use full tonal range, do not show colors that are unbelievable (there are certainly exceptions in creative work), and do all you can to grab the viewer's attention to the primary subject.

A short article on ethics and images begins a discussion of what is considered the photographer's own work. Since there are textures available for sale, the question is whether they can be used. It is clear that all images must be original and may not use any elements produced by someone else. It also means that no images may be totally constructed in a computer, while artwork or computer graphics made by the photographer can be added if the original photographic content dominates. Other articles of interest include one on the wild rose of California, one on Tajikistan, and one by Maria Drumm-who spoke at the Club last November—about the Photo Travel Division. PSA has a scholarship program, and another article shows work by some of the winners, who are majoring in photography in college. You can also see their PSA website work on the at http://psa<u>photo.org/service/psa-scholarship-program/2011-</u>scholarship-gallery/.

Royalty Free Music has been an important issue for PSA, and the organization has consulted with a copyright attorney and obtained advice, which will soon be posted on the PSA website. There will also be an article about it in a coming PSA Journal. In the meantime, you can go to the PSA home page and click on site tools and then on Royalty Free Music, where you will find general information and links for royalty free music. An important point to remember is that "free" does not mean "royalty free," and "royalty free" does not mean "free"! This information is extremely important for anyone who uses music with photographs, especially when put on the Internet on your own website or YouTube and similar places. There are strict rules about using music, and just because you own a CD it does not mean that you have any rights to use it with photographs. Both Amazon.com and iTunes have a wide selection of royalty free music, and there are many other places on the Internet where you can find music at varying prices.

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## NBCC High key/Low key Workshop: A Great Success

On March 2, photographer extraordinaire Chris Hanessian and his team conducted a high key/low key workshop for NBCC members. The lovely, beautiful, and talented Kimmy Page kindly modeled for the NBCC group.

The aim was to shoot images within the accepted definitions of high key and low key, which are:

- a) High key an image that is largely light or white;
  b) Low key an image that is largely dark or black.
- Topics covered included lighting strategies, various methods of strobe control, background selection, lighting angle, and shadow placement. The program emphasized ¾ to close-in portraits. The model did several wardrobe changes, so the photo group got a chance to experiment with a number of lighting/clothes-type combinations.

We started out with high key. In this session, the model wore light outfits and the background was white with lots of back lighting.

We transitioned to low key. In this portion, the model wore darker outfits, the background was effectively black, and dramatic lighting only lit-up a portion of the model's face.

All the participants seemed to be getting some outstanding shots, so the workshop was judged to be a great success! Some examples of the images obtained during the workshop are shown here.

#### **Washington School of Photography**

Interiors and Architecture. Photographing interiors and architectural images can be challenging. In this class, students will learn through following examples and hands-on instruction. They will photograph with both ambient and studio lighting; learn light positioning and settings, white balance control, managing perspective distortion, and how to achieve overall pleasing images of interiors. There will be an architectural photography session on the National Mall in downtown D.C. The class will also address basic editing techniques in Adobe Photoshop, specific to interior and architectural images.

*Instructor:* Alexander Vasiljev. Four sessions: April 2 to 16.

**Portfolio Review.** Bring your portfolio of printed photos to this class and learn how to maximize its potential. Portfolio basics issues will be covered in a lecture format. Also, individual attention will be given to your portfolio with suggestions on image selection, image editing, size and print quality, order and the style of the presentation itself.

Thursday, April 5, 7:00 to 10:00 pm.

Metering and Exposure. Understanding metering and exposure is fundamental to capturing the visual information that you want in your photograph. Otherwise, the photograph may fall short of your expectations. During this workshop, a variety of metering patterns and exposure modes will be covered. Students will learn about matrix metering, center weighted metering, spot metering, and how they affect the outcome of the picture. Manual vs. automatic exposure modes will also be covered. Students will learn about why they shouldn't always use the camera's suggested exposure settings, and about difficult metering situations that can "fool" the camera into producing incorrectly exposed photographs.

**Utilizing Light and Color.** Learn how to use color as an effective compositional element in your photographs. As a photographer, are you "really" seeing color and using it effectively as a compositional element in your work? This hands-on, three-hour workshop is an in depth examination of color as a characteristic of light and using color as a powerful

element of photographic composition. You will learn about color temperature, color theory, color properties, color psychology, white balance setting choices, color space, and more.

#### Annie Leibovitz: Pilgrimage

Annie Leibovitz: Pilgrimage charts a new direction for one of America's best-known living photographers. Unlike her staged and carefully lit portraits made on assignment for magazines and advertising clients, the photographs in this exhibition were taken simply because Leibovitz was moved by the subject. The images speak in a commonplace language to the photographer's curiosity about the world she inherited, spanning landscapes both dramatic and quiet, interiors of living rooms and bedrooms, and objects that are talismans of past lives.

## I Spy: Photography and the Theater of the Street, 1938–2010

Since the invention of small hand-held cameras and faster films in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century, photographers have been fascinated with capturing everyday life in the urban environment. 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#### **Ask Tim Grey**

I am a very amateur bird photographer with a Canon 50D and some better lenses. I use Lightroom 2.7. My question concerns noise reduction. I am considering purchasing Noise Ninja versus upgrading to Lightroom 4. What is your opinion about the pros and cons of these options?

I am really very happy with the new features in Lightroom 4, and I think it is a very worthwhile upgrade. The new lower pricing makes the upgrade all the more attractive. In particular, I think the new Map module is a huge benefit. In your case with bird photography, it makes it relatively easy to identify where a particular photo was taken, so you can return to the same spot the following year to look for a particular species of bird. The Book module is also very nice if you are interested in printing photo books, and there are a variety of other very helpful new features.

From the standpoint of noise reduction, Lightroom 4 does not offer any real advantage over prior versions. But it does still offer good basic noise reduction. If you tend to stick with relatively low ISO settings, such as by using flash to supplement low lighting conditions, then you will probably be served well by the noise reduction in Lightroom 4.

If you tend to utilize high ISO settings on a regular basis, you would certainly benefit from using Noise

Ninja (or another advanced noise reduction tool). Frankly, I would rather not miss out on the benefits of Lightroom 4 (especially compared to Lightroom 2, but even compared to Lightroom 3). So to me the best approach would be to upgrade to Lightroom 4, and then determine if it will provide an adequate degree of noise reduction. My feeling is that Lightroom provides a good solution for relatively modest noise reduction, but when you have a "real" noise issue you will want to opt for something more powerful.

Of course, if you are frequently using very high ISO settings and need to ensure the highest image quality possible, then I would prioritize noise reduction. But honestly, I am so happy with some of the new features of Lightroom 4 that I would rather not miss out on that.
