April 1 Judge: John Hoover

Welcome back John Hoover as our April EIC judge. John is the instructional Lab Coordinator for Photography at Montgomery College in Rockville, and is a working freelance and assignment photographer specializing in portraits, travel and architectural photography. Before that, he served as Director of Photography at the Metropolitan Center for the Visual Arts (VisArts), a non-profit community arts center in Rockville.

In 2009, John taught photography to adolescents enrolled in the Leadership Empowerment and Action Program (LEAP), a youth development program for foster and adopted youth and their families in Montgomery County, in partnership with The Center for Adoption Support and Education (C.A.S.E.) and funded by a grant from the Trawick Foundation. He was awarded the 2007 Excellence in the Arts and Humanities Award by the Montgomery County Arts and Humanities Council, recognizing the contributions he made in improving the Photography Department at VisArts to the point of national recognition among professional photographers and industry specialists.

John's exhibitions have included *Portraits of Life: Holocaust Survivors of Montgomery County* (2005); *Hindustan: Depicting a mystical journey through India's ancient and beautiful culture* (2012); *Spain, Morocco, and Turkey: A photographic journey through three amazing countries* (2013); and currently, *A Bit of Reality, A Bit of Fantasy: Creating one of a kind environmental portraits* (2014).

April 8 Judge: Jill Bochicchio

Ranked among photography's top professionals, Jill A. Bochicchio has crafted a reputation for creativity and excellence. The Maryland Professional Photographer's Association (MDPPA) named her Photographer of the Year for five consecutive years. Kodak Corporation honored her with five Gallery Awards for Photographic Excellence. She has numerous other prestigious awards to her credit.

Her outstanding fine art and commercial photographs have appeared in MDPPA's Traveling Loan Collection, the Professional Photographers of America (PPA) Loan Collection and Masters Loan Collection, and private art exhibits. Her portraits of individuals, families and business leaders throughout the region are widely recognized for their warmth and artistry.

Ms. Bochicchio has earned both a professional Master of Photography degree and a Craftsman degree. She served as President of the MDPPA in 1988 and Chairman of the board in 1989. Currently she serves on its Photo Competition committee. Her articles have appeared in several photography magazines and she is a popular speaker before amateur and professional photographic organizations. She has been the official photographer for the National Philharmonic Orchestra for more than 17 years.

April 29 Program Night: Roy Sewall on “Taking Your Photography to the Next Level”

Possibly you are entering competitions but are having a hard time winning. You want to understand what can make or break a photograph in competition, but judges are not always clear about what they like and don't like, or (more importantly) why.

Even if you aren't competing you are probably driven to improve, and often it's not obvious what to do next.

All of us photographers get stuck in ruts now and then. Many of us spend most of our time doing the same things we've been doing for a while; these ruts can be sufficiently comfortable and satisfying. Some inspired photographers recognize when this is happening, choose to tackle it, and somehow find a way to climb out and move up. The better you get as a photographer the more challenging this is.

NBCC member Roy Sewall believes that the most constructive path forward is to constantly assess your photographic results and figure out what you could have done or will do better. This suggests we need analytical tools to assess photographs.

Over the last 7 years, Roy has judged over 55 times at local and regional camera clubs. After listening to other judges for many years at NBCC, plus thinking back on his own judging, Roy compiled a thorough list of reasons that judges keep photos “in” or toss them “out.” His findings were rather surprising: it only takes 5 “attractors” to make a great photograph, but there are over 60 “detractors” that can bring any photograph to its knees. These findings are the basis of the Critique Groups that Roy has run several times a year for the club for the last four years.

“Taking Your Photography to the Next Level” illustrates each of these attractors and detractors with specific examples. The objective is to provide a well-defined basis for assessing one's own photographs and to learn from other people's photographs.

Note to past Critique Group attendees: the examples provided in this presentation will strongly reinforce what we have talked about.

May Field Trip: Waterside Woolen Mill & Historic Bedford County

The NBCC overnight field trip this year will be to Bedford County, Pennsylvania. The main attraction is the Waterside Woolen Mill in Bedford, PA. Waterside Woolen Mill was built in 1806 on land deeded by the heirs of William Penn. It was in operation until the 1960s and again more recently, but the machinery dates from the mid-late 1800s. So many members have expressed interest that we have reserved the mill for two Saturdays – May 2 and May 9. We will have the mill to ourselves from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, for a cost of \$70 per person. To accommodate everyone comfortably and safely, there is a limit of 14 photographers per day at the Woolen Mill. As of this writing, **there are only two spots left on May 2 and five spots on May 9**, so please contact me right away if you are interested (gbingham@resolv.org).

Bedford County also has many additional attractions for photographers, history buffs and spouses. For those coming early, the Visitors Bureau does a free tour of historic Bedford on Friday afternoons, and there's a spa and golf at the Omni Bedford Springs Hotel. I am planning a scouting trip in April and will provide a list of photography options for Friday afternoon and/or Sunday morning, and for those who may want to come even after the spots at the mill are full. For example, the county has 14 covered bridges, and the [visitor's bureau](#) touts a scenic drive through Morrison's Cove, a "lovely limestone valley with historic villages, country churches, one-room schoolhouses, pristine farmsteads and thousands of contented cows." Other sites include the [Railroaders Memorial Museum](#) in Altoona (about 40 minutes north of Bedford) and the [Flight 93 National Memorial](#) (about 40 minutes west). There should be something for everyone.

Overnight field trips are a nice opportunity for fellowship, so I'll make reservations for dinner for those driving up on Friday afternoon or staying overnight Saturday. There's also a place near the mill for lunch on Saturday.

Detailed logistical information with hotel suggestions, times and directions to meeting sites, and dinner plans will be sent out in April after my scouting trip. Please contact me for more information or if you have suggestions for other interesting places to go in Bedford County.

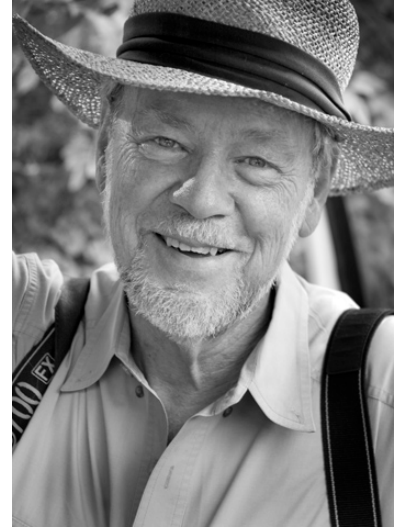
Competition Categories: The Board is continuing to work on revising the Club's competition categories. I announced last month that the Board has decided to do away with the categories of "Traditional" and "Unrestricted" starting next year. Instead, the Board has decided to increase the number of divisions based on photographic expertise. We currently have two divisions, "Novice" and "Advanced." Beginning next year, in the electronic competition, there will be three divisions. It isn't certain yet what those divisions will be called, but you can think of them as "Novice", "Intermediate", and "Advanced." The print competition will continue to have two divisions, most likely referred to as "Intermediate" and "Advanced." So, that creates five competition categories. In addition, there will be a new 6th category available each month. That category will be a rotating theme that is different from the primary theme for the month. It might be a theme involving surrealism or some other form of artistic expression. It might be a nature theme or it might require some specific photographic technique. This rotating 6th category is intended to encourage Club members to experiment, and to push their photographic imagination. There are still some details to be worked out, and we'll keep you informed as final decisions are made. The 6th category will be selected by the Competition Assignments committee, and will be announced well in advance, giving you plenty of time to think about images you would like to create to enter into that category.

Member Profile: Jim Turner

New member, Jim Turner, has been competing in the Advanced Unrestricted category, both in prints and in electronic, and is steadily amassing points. His offerings include several macros of flowers, a stunning image of two pears, and an unusual window-lit self-portrait. He considers himself a relative newcomer to photography, compared to most of the Club members he has met. He bought his first DSLR only three years ago at the suggestion of Kent Mason, joined both the NIH and Silver Spring Camera Clubs and, again at the suggestion of Kent, put himself on the waiting list for NBCC.

Jim was born and raised in Canada in the small town of Dresden, located in the Province of Ontario, about 70 miles north of Detroit. He received a BS degree at Queen's University in Kingston Ontario and then attended the University of Toronto, where he graduated, in 1971, with a Ph.D. in Physics. He spent the next few years studying Physics at the Niels Bohr Institute in Copenhagen before deciding to switch to biomedical research. Returning to Canada, he worked six years in the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto. His next and longest position (28 years) was as a Senior Investigator at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda. The main focus of his research was studying the mechanisms of salt and water secretion in the body. His chief area of study was the salivary glands. He retired from the NIH in 2009.

Jim's wife, Taffy, is also an NIH retiree and is now an active Master Gardner. She was an Administrative Officer in the Clinical Center, the research hospital on the NIH campus. Jim and Taffy have 3rd degree black belts in Judo and met through the NIH Judo Club where they have both practiced and instructed for over 30 years. Taffy has two married daughters who live in the area and the Turners now have 4 grandchildren, ages 11-15. Jim and Taffy have recently replaced Judo with tennis as a more senior-friendly sport. Jim has also recently returned to his "Canadian roots" and re-taken up hockey (after 50 years) with a local senior league, the GeriHatricks. The Turners also ski every year in British Columbia with Jim's younger brother and family.



According to Jim, a large part of his enjoyment of photography comes from working with the incredible software tools that are now available and can enable him to get exactly (or nearly) the look he wants for his images. He uses Photoshop and Nik primarily. In the 1970s he did film photography at the University of Toronto. At that time, his camera was a Nikon FE. He processed his images in the University darkroom and in contrast to modern tools found the experience to be endlessly frustrating and time consuming. He particularly likes doing macro images, mostly flowers, but is now beginning to branch out to other subjects. He has had images juried into the Nature Visions exhibition for the past two years. This year he is the Nature Visions representative for the NIH Club. In 2014, his image "Brookside Water Lily" won a merit award at the Glennies. He also enjoys shooting tennis matches and several of his images have appeared on local websites, including the Citi Open site.

Jim still favors Nikon equipment and owns two DSLR cameras, the D5100 and the D7100. His lenses include a 105mm macro, a 60mm macro and a 70-300mm zoom. He regularly uses a tripod when shooting. He occasionally prints a few images on his Canon Pro 100 but mostly sends his files out to Bay Photo to be printed. He manages to avoid mat cutting by utilizing standard, pre-cut mats for his presentations.

Jim has taken Kent Mason's Visual Design class and made several trips to Dolly Sods with Kent and has enjoyed these experiences very much. He has also participated in the Club's field trips to Mt. Vernon and Longwood Gardens, and attended the Portrait Workshop last November in Rockville. He enjoys the camaraderie of other photographers and welcomes input on his work from teachers and judges. His concerns are not so much to make an art of his photography as to successfully capture whatever caught his eye and to process the image in such a way that others, by viewing it, can share his experience.

PSA News

The March issue of the **PSA Journal** has several items of interest for club members.



Jon Fishback continues his series on judging. He begins with mentioning Alfred Yarbus who began studying how we view images which has influenced judges. He says "Judges are given a tacit task of finding something proper or improper within an image.

How the judge approaches the task pro or con may not matter. The fact is that the task, for the judge, is not to enjoy the image, but to analyze it based on his or her experience." We have all seen photos eliminated by judges for a variety of reasons including that they don't like cats, or have seen a particular subject done better or they can't find a center of interest. I don't think anyone should be discouraged by having an entry tossed out. The next judge may give it a First Place! Jon Fishback is the PSA Director of Education and has developed a series of courses that are available to Individual Members of PSA. It is worthwhile to take a look at what is offered.

PSA started a 365 Day Challenge this year and there is a different subject for each day. Although entries are limited to PSA members, it is worthwhile to look at the list of subject offered so far. Photographers can come up with their own interpretation of the assignment and do not have to submit an image every day. Although it is preferable to take the image on the day of the subject, you can use other photos you already have. The list of subjects may give the competition committee some ideas for future assignments. Bottle is one recent subject and when the club had that assignment, it turned out to be one of the best competitions we've had. Some subjects coming up include: graffiti, hands, shoes, a street view, sweet tooth, scale (which could be interpreted several ways), letter, morning, drink, and lost. Some previous topics were smoke, dazzling, rustic, paper, begins with T and wave, which could also have different interpretations. Not all images submitted are put on the website, but there is an interesting variety. If you are not a PSA member, you can still try some of the topics listed as an exercise in creativity.

The Tips and Techniques column covers the Lightroom adjustment brushes in detail and provides shortcuts to them and filters. Since we had a portrait competition recently, you may be especially interested in the Distinctive Images this month. The article includes beautiful portraits by Susan Cowles, APSA, EPSA who is well known for her work in this area. She teaches portraits in available light for PSA members. She provides details on how she does her portraits and there are lots of examples of her lovely images. There are also articles on the use of video and processing it in Photoshop and the Seasons of the Tetons. For those interested in international destinations, there is a well-illustrated article on Timeless Rajasthan which provides a glimpse into this part of India.

As you may know, PSA has essay competitions in several Divisions. The Photo Travel Essay competition rules and guidelines have just been rewritten to include more information on formats, music and general guidelines. This is open only to PSA members, but some of our club members have essays worthy of this competition. If you have questions about it, just ask or email me. 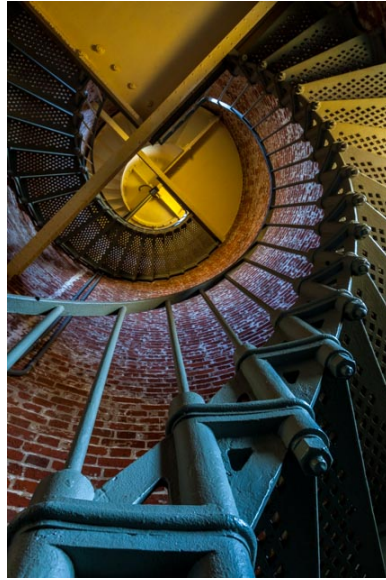

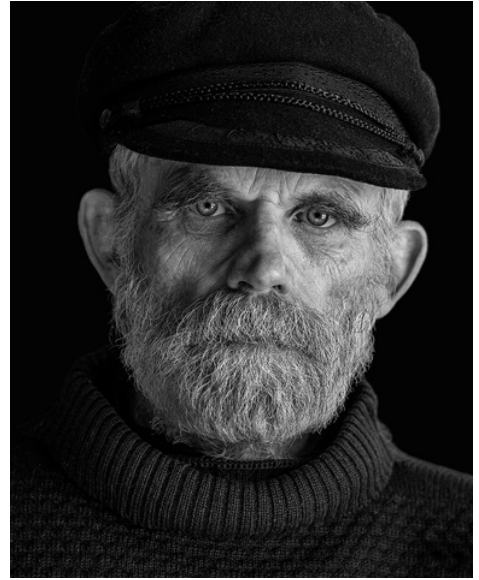
