

Member Profile John Willis



o ince his retirement from the Department of Energy (DOE) in 2005, John has been using photography to integrate and document his interests in gardening, birds, and the natural world. Many of his photos find their way to his website at www.MacGardens.org. He enjoys the challenge of improving both the technical and artistic qualities of his images. His recent competition winners—a grasshopper on a flower blossom and an egret reflected in calm water-and his photo essay-day to evening on Cape May-attest to his progress in nature photography.

I visited John in his home in Frederick and was given a tour of his property, seven and one half acres of woods, pasture, orchards, and gardens in various states of bloom. John and his wife, Beth, enjoy the outdoors and travel, and share gardening as a particular passion. John and Beth have two sons. The eldest, Jonathan, works for Vertex, an innovative pharmaceutical company in Boston. His partner is Tuna Chatterjee, and they have a three vear old daughter, Aoife. Joshua, the younger son, is currently living in Brooklyn and is the director of the Education Center at Turning Point, a non-profit that, among other things, helps motivated people prepare for the GED exams. Jonathan, Josh, and Tuna are all active photographers and have helped spur John's interest and enthusiasm.

John was born in Guelph, a city in Ontario, Canada. In 1949, John's father, lured by the prospect of better employment, immigrated to the United States, settling in Riverside, CA. John has fond memories of growing up in a small city famous for its citrus groves. When it came time for college, he entered the University of California at Riverside, emerging nine years later, in 1971, with a Ph.D. in Physics. His college years also included a junior year abroad, in Gottingen, Germany, where he pursued his scientific education and became fluent in the German language, and some summer employment at the Naval Research Lab in Washington, D.C. In Washington, he also met Beth Melle, a sociology student at the University of Marvland. In 1969, she became his wife. The Riverside newspaper headlined the story "John Willis Marries Eastern Girl."

John's first job after garnering his Ph.D. was with the Naval Research Lab, which brought him and Beth back to the Washington area. John worked at NRL for four years, and then transferred to the Atomic Energy Commission, which became the DOE, in Germantown, MD. He worked for 30 years in the Office of Fusion Energy Services, managing research toward the ultimate sustainable energy source. His responsibilities involved working with scientists and policy makers around the world and gave him many opportunities for overseas travel. He fostered an early introduction of portable computers into the office and made pioneering use of the internet and presentation graphics within the DOE. Although now retired, he tries to keep up with all the latest technologies.

With the advent of digital photography, John easily abandoned his several film cameras for a Canon DSLR (most recently the 7D). With his interest in bird and flower photography, a 100-400mm lens with IS and a 100mm IS macro lens are his go-to lenses. He uses Aperture for post processing and submits images as electronic files for competition. He also uses Aperture to create books of family events and trips he and Beth have taken. For exhibitions, he has pictures printed at an external lab.

John applied to the NBCC in 2009 on the recommendation of Ira Adler, a co-worker at the DOE. He waited a year to be accepted. John, Ira, Mike Walker, and two other photographers from the "DOE days" regularly meet to discuss photo ops and evaluate their images. John also participates in Roy Sewall's critique group, Kent Mason's Visual Design Classes, and has taken courses with Alan Dietrich at Chanticleer Gardens and with Josh Taylor at the U.S. Botanical Gardens. He and Beth accompanied the Adlers to Barcelona for an enjoyable trip, half tourism, half photography, and John has also traveled to Sanibel (February 2012), Costa Rica, Death Valley, Sedona, and Machu Picchu. Family trips to Calcutta, for Jonathan and Tuna's Indian wedding, and another family excursion to the Galapagos have given him many opportunities for photography.

John is thoroughly enjoying the NBCC and is especially grateful for the learning opportunities made possible by more experienced members. He sees the competition process as key to improving his photography and is pleased to subject his images to critical review.


R anked among photography's top professionals, Jill A. Bochicchio has crafted a reputation for creativity and excellence. Past President and Chair of the Board of the Maryland Professional Photographers Association (MDPPA), Jill served on the board for five years. Her photography has earned her numerous national and international awards for creativity. MDPPA named her Photographer of the Year for five consecutive years. Most recently in 2012, Jill was named Master Illustrative Photographer of the Year.

Her award winning fine art and commercial photographs have appeared in MDPPA's Traveling Loan Collection, the Professional Photographers of America (PPA) Loan Collection and Masters Loan Collection, and private art exhibits. Her photographs have also been exhibited at Epcot in Florida.

In 2010 Jill was given the most prestigious and the highest photography honor, the Professional Photographers of America (PPA) National Award. The year prior, in 2009, the South Eastern Professional Photographers Association (SEPPA) had also honored her with the SEPPA Award for Outstanding Service in photography to Maryland. The Maryland Professional Photographers Association presented Jill with a life membership, for 27 years of service to the association.

Jill Bochicchio has photographed many top executives, such as the Director of the FDA for a magazine cover and the Chief of Police of Gaithersburg for *The Police Chief* magazine cover. Her portraits of individuals, families, children, brides, musicians, and business leaders throughout the region are widely recognized for their warmth and artistry.





Jill has earned both a professional Master of Photography degree and a Craftsman degree. She served as President of MDPPA in 1988 and as Chair of the board in 1989. Her articles have appeared in several photography magazines, and she is a popular speaker and judge for amateur and professional photographic organizations.

Jill Bochicchio has been the official photographer for the National Philharmonic Orchestra for seventeen plus years.

will demonstrate white screen photography. This technique, popular now for videos, portraits, events and even product photography, involves the use of a neutral white background, either stationary or mobile, evenly lit for maximum reflectivity. In the first step of what will be a composited image, persons or things are posed in front of the background and are photographed with proper exposure.

In step two, the image is processed in Photoshop and the subject is extracted from its white background. The image can then be resized and repositioned and added to any pre-selected background image which serves as its new environment. The results can be quite dramatic and appear three dimensional. Hopefully, Andrew will share with us some of the intricacies necessary to make the finished image successful.



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NBCC Field Trip – May 18 – 20 <u>Lewes, Delaware</u>

While most NBCC field trips are one day affairs, we sometimes schedule longer ones for special sites. This year's trip to Lewes, DE, is one such. The small town, founded in 1631, has many facets. A YouTube video on the Chamber of Commerce homepage (www.leweschamber.com) provides a very nice overview of some of the highlights. By scheduling the trip to include two evenings and two mornings, we hope to provide good light for the kinds of photo opportunities one finds at the shore.

The weekend prior to Memorial Day promises fair weather. The location at the point where the Delaware River flows into the Atlantic Ocean provides a unique range of terrains from migratory bird habitat, to exposed sandy beach, to sheltered harbors of refuge. There are even fortifications, lighthouses, and lookout towers.

On the maritime sides Lewes offers lots of boating and fishing activity. Canals and docks abound. A restored lightship is a major attraction. There is also a colonial aspect to the place, with old houses of Dutch and British design. The Zwaanendael Museum is a piece of Dutch architecture that holds exhibits of cultural and historical interest. All of the above can lead to good photo opportunities. The place has seen quite a lot of history.

As a resort town, Lewes offers a wide assortment of lodging and dining spots. I would appreciate it if NBCC members who intend to take part in the trip would contact me at idbscience@me.com ahead of time, so that we can exchange cellphone numbers to coordinate activities where it is desirable to do so. It might be nice to schedule one or two get-togethers to share ideas and experiences. An orientation session Friday evening might be useful.

Let me warn you to make reservations for lodgings as soon as possible. Ellen and I are booked into the Hotel Rodney. The Chamber of Commerce Accommodations page has a list of places that bear looking into.

There is a new moon at the morning high tides at this time of year, which is appropriate for horseshoe crab nesting behavior. Some of our more intrepid members may want to try their luck at this. It must, however, be noted that this activity is a) quite unpredictable and a bit of a crap shoot, b) requires special care, and c) is not for everyone. If you really want to try this, I can point you to other NBCC members who have tried their hands at it.

I would like to express my appreciation to Judy Rolfe, a professional photographer who practices in Lewes, for providing background information and ideas.

Denali National Park with Mollie Isaacs and Mary Lindhjem. This tour offers a unique opportunity to stay deep within the park and truly explore the character of Denali. In addition to a wide variety of spectacular photographic experiences, participants will benefit from the expertise of naturalist guides. Participants will be transported within Denali in a private vehicle by an educated naturalist driver who will help them access some excellent areas for exquisite flora and fauna native to the region. Not only is this a premier photo tour with expert instruction, it also has the added benefit of providing educational knowledge in the natural and cultural history of this majestic part of Alaska.

The base of operation will be deep inside the park at family-owned and operated North Face Lodge, a lovely north-country inn with cozy, well-appointed rooms, private baths, delicious meals, and fresh-baked goods. Located 90 miles into the heart of Denali, the lodge is less than two miles from famous Wonder Lake, and has incredible views of Mt. McKinley and the Alaskan Range.

oincidence or not? The April issue of the PSA Journal includes an article about the PSA photo collection, which is housed at [Artspace] at Untitled in Oklahoma City, where PSA headquarters is located. We were fortunate to see the gallery on our way to California. It was impressive to see the diversity in the exhibit "Reconsidering the Family of Man" as well as the 1940s exhibit that is the current exhibit of PSA's "Decade by Decade" series which started with the 1920s and will continue through the 1960s. One of the most well-known photographs, "Flag Raising at Iwo Jima, Feb. 23, 1946" by Joseph Rosenthal is part of the 1940s exhibit. The gallery has work by noted Baltimore photographer Aubrey Bodine, Ansel Adams, Otto Litzel, Farm Security Administration photographer Arthur Rothstein, William Mortenson, Yousuf Karsh, Dorothy Lange, Arnold Newman, Wellington Lee, and Barry Goldwater. Jan Burris, the Executive Director of Untitled who is a private art consultant specializing in photography, suggested that PSA keep their collection and show it in Oklahoma City. The collection shows a great variety of many photographic printing processes. The "Reconsidering the Family of Man" exhibit was inspired by Edward Steichen's original "Family of Man" from 1955, which is being restored for exhibition in his native Luxembourg. Burris says that the gallery's "Reconsidering the Family of Man" was set up to show the diversity of the PSA collection using Steichen's concept.

Book reviews in the April Journal include: Creative Digital Photography, Boudoir Photography, Family Photography, Pristine Waters—Preserving the Chain of Lakes, and Posing for Portrait Photography. "Drury's Digital Diary" continues from a past article; it includes an evaluation of images given previously and shows you how to write Curves to correct the problems in those pictures. It includes the images as illustrations.

Much of the April *PSA Journal* is about the Conference in September, including lists of classes and programs that give you an idea of what the conference is all about. There is an article titled "Capturing the Essence of Cuba" in which the author discusses

how to make a variety of images to make a better show. He says "The trick is to mix it up and keep the audience's attention from start to finish by providing a sampling of each of the characteristic parts that make up the whole of the place you're photographing." He also provides good information on equipment and travel photography, which could be helpful for any kind of trip. Another article, "Orchid Metaphors," discusses interpreting an image in a personal way, and the images show how capturing a small portion of an orchid can make an excellent photograph.

The PSA Collection is certainly worth seeing and I recommend it, as well as the California Museum of Photography at the University of California Riverside. The museum includes a walk-in Camera Obscura, as well as a large collection of Kodak Brownie and other cameras. When we visited the museum, there was a wonderful collection of stereographs on exhibit with viewers available for the best viewing of the 3D images.

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NBCC Photographers Recognized in Glennie Competition

Five of the ten images submitted by NBCC members were selected by the judges for recognition in the recent Glennie Nature Interclub Competition. The Glennie is an international competition and this year 94 clubs from seven countries competed. Each club was allowed to submit ten nature photographs. The categories of subjects permitted included animals, birds, fish, plants, landscapes, and insects as long as there was no indication of human involvement.

Though we had to rush the NBCC entry due to a late start, 19 members submitted 42 images that were judged by an NBCC panel made up of Chris Hanessian, Roy Sewall, and Alan Sislen. The ten images selected were entered by Art Hyder, Barbara DeLouise, Bruce Cyr, David Davidson, Evelyn Jacob, Gordie Corbin, John Willis, Kent Mason, and Rhoda Steiner.

Though we were not a top finisher as a club, it is important to recognize that five of the ten images we submitted were in the final selections, and two of them received higher level awards. One of Art Hyder's images was in the top five of the 940 photographs submitted, with his entry "Grouse in Winter," while Gordie Corbin received a Merit Award for her image "Black Neck Swan Cygnet Napping." The other three images recognized in the final selections were submitted by David Davidson, Rhoda Steiner, and Art Hyder.

When you look at the overall Glennie results for all of the images NBCC submitted, you can see how close the other five submissions were to the top of their respective categories. If you scroll to the bottom of the Glennie website, there are other links that provide all the data for the entire competition.

family of four recently obtained my services to take a family portrait in black and white (of course!). I instructed the two ladies on how they may fix their hair and what to wear, etc. They went off taking around two hours to get ready. Meanwhile, who knows what the two male members of the family did in that interval.

The whole group arrived early in the evening. The light was perfect, soft, even, and uniform; so I placed the family near some neutral vegetation.

Meanwhile, I loaded the film, took a light reading with my hand-held light meter, set the focus manually, set the shutter speed and f/stop manually. At the right moment, I made the shot. At this point I started packing up my gear.

"What, are you crazy or something???!! No-one takes just one shot!," stated the father. "Do you know how long we spent getting ready??," stated the mother. "We have never heard of anyone taking only one photo! This is weird!," exclaimed the kids.

The next day I went to the darkroom, developed the photo, printed/finished the print, and made the delivery. "Boy are we happy!" all exclaimed. "We have never seen anything like this!!!!" The photo below shows the final product.

The moral of this story is that the only photos that really matter are the good ones, and you do not necessarily have to take a lot of photos to achieve your goals. After all, what are you going to do with all those photos that do not meet your highest standards?



<u>Frances Benjamin Johnston Collection</u> Digitized by the Library of Congress

Frances Benjamin Johnston (1864-1952) was one of the first American women to achieve prominence as a photographer. Trained at the Académie Julian in Paris, she studied photography upon her return to Washington, D.C., in the mid-1880s and opened a professional studio circa 1890. Her family's social position gave Johnston access to the First Family and leading Washington political figures and launched her career as a photojournalist and portrait photographer. Johnston turned to garden and estate photography in the 1910s.

Through copyright deposits, gifts of the photographer, and the purchase of material from her estate, the Prints and Photographs Division of the Library of Congress has formed an extensive collection of Johnston's documentary assignments and architectural studies. The portion of the collection that is presented on-line in the Frances Benjamin Johnston Collection category are individual photographs for which copy negatives or digital files exist. This represents a small cross-section of the entire Johnston collection. which consists of an estimated 20,000 photographic prints and 3,700 glass and film negatives. Most of the photographic prints have been grouped by subject matter into groups (LOTs). Catalog records describing those groups are available through the Groups of Images in High Demand category.

Images in the collection span the period, 1850-1949, but the majority date between 1897 and 1927. Among the photographs from Johnston's early career are her coverage of American world's fairs; coal mining; the White House; openings of Congress; Admiral Dewey; and Progressive era educational efforts, including a survey of Washington, D.C., schools and such minority educational institutions as the Hampton Institute and the Tuskegee Institute. The collection also includes photographs collected by Johnston, including images of family and friends and works by other women photographers.

Johnston was one of the first contributors to the Library's Pictorial Archives of Early American Architecture. With the support of the Carnegie Corporation, she also executed a systematic survey of southern architecture known as the Carnegie Survey of Architecture of the South. These two collections are considered to be separate from the Frances Benjamin Johnston Collection, although the contents of the collections overlap to some degree. 

To get there, take I-270 to Exit 11, Route 124. Go through the traffic light at Route 355; then go to the third traffic light and take a right on Lost Knife Road to the end, at a traffic light at Odenthal Road. Go straight across this intersection to the gated entrance to Asbury. Stop at the guard station (number 10 on the map below) and just tell the attendant you are going to a dinner in Rosborough Hall.

Right after you go through the guard station, you will come to a stop sign. Go straight through it and proceed a few hundred yards, where you will see Building #409 (number 5 on the map below). Rosborough Hall is on the right. Park in any unmarked spot (not reserved for handicapped or residents). Note that there are also more parking spots in a lot across the main street, Asbury Drive.

In Vibrant Color: Vintage Celebrity Portraits from the Harry Warnecke Studio

Well before color reproductions and color snapshots became commonplace, pioneering photographer Harry Warnecke (1900-1984) and his associates at the New York Daily News' Color Studio created brilliant, richly-hued portraits for the newspaper's Sunday News magazine.

Employing a special one-shot camera of his own design, Warnecke began producing color images for the Daily News in the 1930s by utilizing the technically demanding, tri-color carbro process—an early form of color photography. Over the course of several decades. Warnecke and his team photographed hundreds of people in the news, from popular film stars and athletes to military leaders and government officials.

Drawing from the NPG's collection of large-format, tricolor carbo photographs originally created under the auspices of the Daily News, this exhibition will feature twenty-four celebrity portraits from the 1930s and 1940s including Lucille Ball, Jackie Robinson, Babe Didrikson, Gene Autry, Ethel Waters, Generals Eisenhower and Patton, and comedians W.C. Ask Tim Grey

How do we change the Folder Name in Lightroom once it has been imported? It is very easy to change the File Name but I do not see a way to change the Folder Name.

I suspect you have been using the Rename Photo command found on the Library menu, which would explain why you are not finding the option to rename a folder.

It is indeed possible to rename any folder that contains images currently being managed by Lightroom. All you need to do is right-click on the folder in guestion in the Folders section of the left panel in the Library module and choose Rename from the popup menu. A simple dialog will then appear where you can type a new name for the folder. When you click Save, the folder will be renamed.

It is worth noting that if you want to rename photos or folders and are using Lightroom to manage your images, it is very important to perform the renaming from within Lightroom. If you rename photos or folders outside the context of Lightroom, then Lightroom will no longer be able to find the affected images and will report them as being missing. It is much easier to stay in the practice of only renaming within Lightroom than to fix missing photos or folders later.
