The field trip committee tries to meet diverse needs and interests by choosing a variety of subject matter and by scheduling some field trips on weekends and some on weekdays to accommodate members' different schedules. We also organize different types of field trips, including informal meetups, regular field trips nearby, and overnight excursions. We have a great start on ideas for the year ahead, AND we'd love to hear from you if you have a suggestion. (Several of the ideas you recommended on your membership forms made it into this year's plans already!) Places where members might not have access to otherwise are particularly popular. Hopefully all of you have been and will continue to have a fulfilling, healthy summer. Although for the majority of NBCC members, the program year will not start until September, rest assured there has been a great deal of activity from the very dedicated committee members to get the wheels in motion for an exciting and challenging year! I personally am very honored and excited to be a part of such an impressive group and am looking forward to meeting our new members at the orientation on August 29th. We even have some new members already serving on our committees! We have a great leadership team, with both returning and new committee chairs and members. The new committee composition can be found on our organization section of the website, as well as later in this newsletter. The program, judges and field trip committees already have many of our year's activities planned for and we have our competition assignments available with a two-year lookahead. The education committee has a great start of identifying small group facilitators and will publish the list of available groups later this summer.

Each incoming president sets forth his/her targeted initiatives, and I'd like to share mine at this time. The first, and most important to me, is to promote our members more actively. What this might look like is having a section of our website – either public or private – where people's websites would be posted. In addition, we have many people who are competing and/or exhibiting in external venues; horn tooting is most welcome and it would be great to have a place to do so!

Secondly, I would like to see our club expand its community outreach program. Currently, we have two specific organizations that we support. Although there are many of us who already use our skills in photography pro bono, my vision is having small groups of us volunteer to take and make available photos for people who are not able to have that luxury. Going into a shelter, a senior home, and the like would be the kind of situation I have in mind, but I'm sure there are many other opportunities for us to give back as a club.

The last initiative I would like to pursue is to use technology more to our advantage. What this might look like is a revised website that would allow us to have a private members only section where we could at a minimum have our contact info online. Using electronic forms for our applications and member payment would save our committee members much time in transcribing information from handwritten forms.

We have an amazing group of people and photographers and only by providing input and support will that continue. I look forward to the 2018 – 2019 program year unfolding!

### **PSA News**



PSA really is becoming a worldwide organization. President Elena McTighe visited a conference in China, one of the most involved places in PSA. They have many award-winning photographers and hold exhibitions throughout the year. Representatives from the Royal Photographic Society, Fédération Internationale de l'Art Photographique (FIAP) and the Global Photographic Union (GPU) also attended the conference.

Because of all the international connectedness, PSA has changed their rule about titling color and monochrome images from the same digital file. They must now have the same title - which will make it easier for all participants.

For all you Olympus and Panasonic users, the Panasonic/Leica 100-400 4-6.3 lens has a favorable review in the April issue of the *PSA Journal*. While it apparently has a few drawbacks, the reviewer recommends it for wildlife and said his images were sharp and had good color and contrast. It is equivalent to 200-800mm and weighs just 2.17 pounds—considerably less than a 35mm lens!

Another review of interest is "Photo Raw 2018.1" by ON1 Software. It is a stand-alone program but can be used with Photoshop and Lightroom. There is no annual fee for the program.

PSA has added another distinction (QPSA) which requires just 54 acceptances in qualified exhibitions. The next level (PPSA) requires 288 acceptances and additional distinctions require more. As with all distinctions, an applicant must present star certificates to show evidence of the number of acceptances. One may not count more than the required number so it is easy to "lose" credit for acceptances by using a good image too many times.

The PSA conference will take place in Salt Lake City this coming October and promises to be a good one with some great trips planned and notable speakers including Rick Sammon and Tom Till.

The June issue of the *PSA Journal* includes an interesting article about judging written by Brian Swinyard, PPSA, ARPS, EFIAP/b, a photographer in the UK. He said he looks for three things: 1) technical competence: exposure, sharpness, tonal range, color saturation; 2) artistic merit: composition, depth of field. Finally, he looks for 3) "something of the photographer in the picture through visual story." He also provides good advice for all photographers: "Never apologize for your photography;" "Don't get bent out of shape if a judge doesn't like your image" (that is just one person's opinion); and "Produce images for yourself and not for judges; otherwise your photography will never improve." I think his last statement is important to remember!

Remember, anyone can enter PSA exhibitions which are listed on the PSA website. The PSA International is a good place to try your work against photographers from all over the world. The deadline is **August 9**. See <a href="http://www.psa-photo.org/psa-international">http://www.psa-photo.org/psa-international</a>. There are several essay competitions, but they are open only to individual PSA members. The Projected Image Division has several options, as does the Photojournalism Division. The Photo Travel Division has two—a full length essay similar to those done at NBCC and a mini-essay which is a collection of 20 images that meet the photo travel definition. Information about all of them can be found on the PSA website under the relevant divisions.

### **PSA Member News**

Larry Mars has continued his success in PSA Exhibitions with acceptances in a variety of places. He received 3

acceptances in Photo Travel in the Digitalna Exhibit in Croatia, 3 in Nature in Trierenberg (Austria), 2 in Monochrome and 5 in travel in DPW Four in Serbia and did very well in the SAM Circuit in India - with 10 acceptances in monochrome, 12 in travel and 11 in Nature. **Judy Burr** was quite happy with her results in the Georgia Circuit (GASO), having received 13 acceptances in Color, 16 in Monochrome and 14 in Nature. One of the color images was taken with an iPhone using the InstaBooth camera and the Jobs setting. Encouraged by Larry's success in India, Judy entered the JCM Circuit and was awarded a medal for the Best of Still Life in Monochrome (see photo on left) along with 5 more acceptances for the image. Her total was 13 in Monochrome, 11 in Color and 10 in Travel.

**Judy** spent more time on record keeping than on exhibitions and received her 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> stars in Nature and her first Galaxy in Projected Image Color. After achieving 5 stars in a Division, the Galaxy is the next goal. That requires 25 titles with 3 acceptances for each. Any beyond that do not count. Judy was awarded her Galaxy 1 in Color.

**Kathryn Mohrman** recently joined PSA as an Individual. With all her travel images, I have encouraged her to try out some exhibitions and Travel Essays.

The Maryland Photography Alliance now has 14 membership clubs. One of the Alliance's primary goals is to foster better judging at the various club meetings. To start, they plan to get each club to identify a person from within the club to volunteer to receive training to become a judge.

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### **Nature Visions 2018**

Nature Visions Photography Exposition (NVPE) 2018 will be held on November 2-4, 2018. The location will be the same as last year, the Hylton Performing Arts Center, Manassas, VA. The overall schedule will be similar to last year, with three full days of seminars, lectures, vendors, workshops, parrot shoot, raptor shoot, image reviews, and other activities. The schedule again includes numerous well-known speakers, including Julieanne Kost, Thomas Heaton, Cole Thompson, Denise Ippolito, Tim Cooper, and numerous others.

NBCC is one of eight participating camera clubs and members are encouraged to enter the annual expo competition; prints of winning photos are displayed during the expo. There have been no major changes in the rules or topics for the annual competition. The six nature categories are: birds, wildlife, macro, landscape, flora, and water. The rules for nature entries are clear; there can be no human elements. This includes, but is not limited to, images of people, objects constructed by humans, evidence of human activity, etc. The photo art category is for non-nature images; images that conform to the nature category rules may not be entered into the photo art completion. Post-processing of images is generally permitted, but with some exceptions and the rules for the nature categories and the photo art category are different. All the rules can be found at the NVPE website and members are encouraged to read them before submitting entries. Each club member can enter 6 nature images and 2 photo art images. This will be the fourth year that NBCC has been a member of this expo and the club has previously done very well in the competition. We hope NBCC members will plan to attend the expo and to enter the competition.

Details on the program and the competition rules can be found on the NVPE webpage (<a href="http://naturevisions.org">http://naturevisions.org</a>). Online registration will begin in early August. **Upload of images begins Aug. 13 and ends Sept. 21**. Images uploaded before Sept. 15 will be examined by a NVPE committee to check for adherence to the rules and those that are rejected can be replaced. The list of accepted images will be released in the second week of October and prints will be collected by NBCC before the end of October.

## 1st Place Winners, May (Open - B&W) Competition

I was exploring the countryside, north of Montreal, Canada, at the beginning of May. Snow was melting and there was water everywhere. Above a small waterfall, I was instantly enthralled by the ethereal free play of the mist in front of the stationary strict form of the trees. I grabbed my camera from the car and I started shooting different shapes and compositions. This tree was standing out from the rest. Post processing helped me emphasize what I was seeing while shooting.

Five-panel Panoramic-HDR image of rooms in the Administrative House in the hospital complex at Ellis Island. Great venue for old-abandoned rooms, wallpaper textures and architecture from another century plus opportunities for views of the Manhattan skyline and the Statue of Liberty. . Technical: High contrast required 5-stops for each panel, tripod, iso 100/ f11 at 17mm in the portrait mode. Stitching via Photoshop CC followed by B&W conversion from color image. Contrast control to give final image more "pop" using (in sequence): Levels, curves, Gaussian Blur then soft-light from embedded-CC apps.

## Advanced EIC - Matanuska Glacier © Bill Ho

I haven't competed in a while as my interests have shifted to abstracts and street photography-subjects not usually popular with the judges. This Matanuska Glacier photo with the dramatic clouds was taken on a family vacation trip to Alaska. I didn't think much about it until I was asked to do a B&W conversion demo for another camera club. This image was chosen to show how selectively darkening the blue part of the sky can really help some images pop. Fortunately, it popped well enough for NBCC's conveniently timed B&W competition.

Savannah Oak: I loved the trees we saw on our recent bike trip between Charleston and Savannah. Their size and structure caught my attention. Using tips from the NBCC black and white program, I used Lightroom to process in color, then tried various black and white versions. I finally settled on the infrared version.

I was in Merida, the capital of the Yucatan. Our guide pointed out statues on top of the old Spanish government building, which was several centuries old. As I recall, he said they represented the native Maya. The statues were covered by wire netting, I suppose to prevent any loose stones from falling on people. I was fascinated by the way the eyes were carved, and I took the picture in spite of the fact that I thought the wire net ruined it. It was only later when I was processing it that it struck me that the netting made it more powerful, as a representation of captivity.

The arrangement of the trees and the lines of the fields around them really spoke to me. Although I took the same shot with my regular Nikon D610 in color, this version, taken on an infrared converted D7000, is more dramatic to me.

I think the pose and expression in this image caught the defiant attitude of this model, who dressed revealingly and flashily despite not fitting the mold of a beauty. Her shirt says, "Perfect, Beautiful, African American Woman."

Amelia Island, early spring at high tide. I love the beach when it is empty and I can focus on individuals and how they use the beach. For me it is even better when there are interesting clouds, especially in this one when the dark cloud hung over this man. It tells a story.

I decided to capture as many of the trees as I could as they seemed to be in a pleasing array. Post processing in LR was mainly selecting B&W treatment and enhancing contrast and clarity.

The image was taken in Etosha National Park, Namibia, on July 2, 2017 with a Canon EOS 5D Mark III using a Sigma 120-400 mm lens. The ostriches had just stopped for a drink in a water hole & I took several images because I found the herd of ostriches fascinating. But the only time the herd was in a more cohesive group was as it was leaving, which I thought made it a better entry for the competition.

Traditionally young women had their faces tattooed in their early teenage years - whether as tribal identification or coming-ofage or simple beauty, I don't know. Today only elderly women still have tattoos; this woman is 104 years old, still with all her senses. One friend said that she has "the face of eternity."

It's an iPhone image, with the following post processing: a little cropping, perspective correction, and other LightRoom adjustments; conversion to B&W in Nik; and then detail brush work back in LightRoom to get a good tonal range and detail.



## Novice EIC - Lower Manhattan © **Tom Marchessault**

View from a Circle Line boat tour of Manhattan, May 2017, mid-morning. To emphasize the waterfront, I gave it a panoramic perspective. The original had much more water in the foreground; cropping it off changed the relative dimensions which emphasized the horizontal aspects of the image rather than the vertical height of the buildings. The second was to transform it to an almost film noir version of Manhattan reminiscent of an earlier time. Most of the post-processing was in Lightroom although some of the cleaning up was undertaken using Photoshop.
